

2023 Texas Tree Climbing Competition





 2^{023} marks 40 years since the Texas Chapter hosted its first 'Jamboree'!

This year's competition was held at Richard Moya Park in Austin, Texas on May 18th, 19th & 20th. Thursday's bi-lingual precompetition workshop consisted of practical knowledge associated with everyday tree work, designed to help assist climbers with understanding of SRS & MRS systems, practical aerial rescue approaches and discussed rigging techniques. The workshop, taught by Mark Chisholm and Erick Palacios with assistance from Abram Zies, Jimmy Prichard and Eric Maldonado, allowed climbers to get face-to-face with the instructors and demo different ideas and strategies, making new and old techniques become realized rather than the standard lecture-style class setting and proved to be a great networking opportunity for the climbing community.

The preliminary events, held on Friday, went off without a hitch or hiccup and all of the hard work led by so many new and repeat volunteers was a reflected by how smoothly the day went. A lot of new faces showed up to volunteer and help in any way they could, and it really proved to be an exciting look at the future of the industry in Texas. 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Member Spotlight ··

Casey Hildebrandt

You've been around tree care for a long time, but your degree is in mechanical engineering. What inspired you to change paths to start a business and make it a career?

In 1977 my dad, Rick Hildebrandt, started a thirty seven year career with Asplundh. My two younger brothers and I spent many, many weekends throughout our childhood doing tree work to earn extra money with our dad. He often joked that he wanted to work our butts off while we were young to teach us the value of a college education. While I was finishing up my degree at Texas Tech I had a family friend tell me a joke at church one morning. He asked if I knew what an engineer uses for birth control?....Personality. This friend was an engineer type so the joke was all in good fun and not meant to be rude or offensive. However, it did get me thinking that spending the next thirty years of my life in an office working with a bunch of other engineers didn't seem very exciting. I always knew I wanted to start my own company but wasn't sure what exactly. I played around with a couple of ideas after college and ultimately came back to trees. I think once a person gets sawdust in their blood it's hard to get it out. Hence, Hildebrandt Tree Tech was founded in 2010.

How has being a Certified Arborist and a member of Texas Chapter ISA made a difference for you?

I once heard someone say that five years from now you will be exactly the same person you are today except for the books you read and the people you meet. I have always placed a high value in my life on gaining knowledge and learning from others. In the tree industry one of our absolute best resources for growing as a professional is through our local ISA chapter. I joined the Texas chapter when I started Hildebrandt Tree Tech and began attending as many conferences and classes as I could. The networking and knowledge gained by being part of this group has been a huge contributing factor to our growth over the years.

Hildebrandt Tree Tech is built on great principles; one of which is the fantastic team. Tell us the best part of working with family.

The best part of Hildebrandt Tree Tech is our people, hands down. Without good people a company is nothing. My wife, Samye, has supported me and worked with HTT throughout the years at different times in various



capacities. Without her, HTT would not exist. She believed in me and for the first few years we lived primarily on her income (from her job as a speech pathologist) so we could get HTT off the ground. I have also had the blessing of working with my brother Kelly Hildebrandt as part of the HTT team since 2012. Kelly spent his college days playing football for Mike Leach at Texas Tech and there's really not anything he can't do when it comes to our industry from crane removals to sales. In 2014, our dad Rick retired from Asplundh and joined the HTT team working in sales. His wisdom and life experience is priceless. Our first full time office person is my wife's aunt, Edie Tunstall. Edie has been with us since 2015. Although most of our 35 plus team members are not blood related, they are all part of the Hildebrandt Tree Tech family and a vital part of what we do everyday.

What is one thing that makes tree care in Lubbock unique that you'd like to share with other people around Texas?

Trees are hard to come by in West Texas and because of that people place a lot of value in taking good care of them. Although many of our trees are vertically challenged due to crazy winds and harsh environmental conditions, Lubbock has a very healthy urban forest. Many of our West Texas communities are spread out so it's not uncommon for us to have crews traveling 90 plus miles to serve customers weekly. Another somewhat unique aspect of tree care in West Texas is that trees really aren't supposed to grow here. The South Plains was grassland. So most trees growing here are under a fair amount of stress all the time and that tends to lead to more insect and stress-related disease problems than seen in other parts of the state.










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Late Summer 2023 Events Update

TSA Texas has hosted/assisted with over 20 events in the first half of 2023. Fall is conference season. The 2023 Texas Tree Conference registration is open! We can't wait for you to join us at the Waco Convention Center from September 20-22 for all the exciting speakers, networking, and activities planned.

Three specialized Academies (TDA, Diversity in Texas Tree Communities, and ISA Utility Specialist Certification Study Session)

- Certification exams (TRAQ renewal and CA exam).
- Credential holders can earn up to 15 CEUs.
- All-day Tree Schools (English and Spanish).
- Networking with 1,000 other tree care professionals.

As a benefit to current Texas Chapter ISA members, use your ISA CSID number to receive a 10% discount off Academy and Conference registrations. This discount totals the cost of membership!

Planning is under way for 2024. The master's series workshop will focus on tree and plant appraisal. We will bring in 3-4 experts for an in-depth look at tree appraisal. We hope to have this event at the end of January.

We are planning to host at least 3 full TRAQ courses spread between Houston, Austin, San Antonio and the Dallas/ Fort Worth area. They will be in January, April, and June (depending on instructor's schedule). In February, we assist with the North Texas Urban Forestry conference and the San Antonio Arborist Association's bilingual workshop. We hope to be able to continue the diagnosis workshop at the Plant Disease Diagnostic Laboratory in College Station and the Texas Wildfire Risk Reduction Qualification workshop in March.

The Texas Tree Climbing Championship will be held in May--usually the Friday and Saturday after Mother's Day. We have reserved May 22-23 and June 12-13 for the Texas Oak Wilt Qualification workshop. There will be a TOWQ renewal in between those dates.

Remember, current ISA Texas members are emailed the registration link to the above workshops 7–10 days before non-members. We target having the registration up 6-8 weeks prior to the event, sooner if all the planning comes together.

Austin Closer to Its Canopy Goal: 50% by 2050


The City of Austin acquired geospatial data showing what tree canopy looked like from above in late summer of 2022. This effort, repeated ever four years, documents progresses in tree planting and tree protection.

Data were analyzed and insights can be found in this online Story Map https://arcq.is/045LbW

Chief among these insights? The data show 41% canopy cover citywide in 2022—up from 36% in 2018. With their Climate Equity Plan, the City of Austin aims to achieve 50% canopy cover by 2050. And with maps and

graphs, the Story Map shows how the City's canopy goal could be achieved by examining possible planting space around Austin.

Texas Tree Critters



Yellownecked Caterpillar (Datana ministra)

- Caterpillars grow up to 2 inches long and have yellow and black stripes that run the length of their bodies; they have a solid black head and a yellow collar around their necks
- Produce a large amount of frass that covers driveways, sidewalks, decks, etc. (usually noticed by their frass)
- Pest Status: Defoliators of Oaks and other hardwoods; they usually appear in early Summer
